IRISH OPEN CHAMPIONSHIP

The 2017 Irish Open was held at the Townhouse Hotel, Naas, Co Kildare, from 28th to 31st of October inclusive. Most competitors took advantage of accommodation at the venue and because it was a Bank Holiday weekend were treated to cabaret entertainment each night.

There were two sections of play with fifteen master players and ten intermediate players. Tournament Controller was Graham Young, ably assisted by Myles Hannigan and local organiser Bill Dobbins.

The presence in the field of former British Champion Colin Young, along with other players from Scotland, plus former Ladies World GAYP Champion Nadia Chyzhevska, from Ukraine, gave the competition a true international flavour.

A few top Irish Players were missing owing to personal or health reasons but the Masters section was still a tough competition. An indication of the closeness in playing ability was the spread of a mere three points margin between players from 5th to 15th place.

The current British Champion, Shane McCosker, justified his tag of favourite by duly securing yet another title, but this was not a runaway stroll. After a full four rounds he was only two points ahead of a chasing pack of no less than six players. Shane's superior win/draw ratio ensured he stayed ahead to finish three points clear of arch rival Myles Hannigan. Myles is playing great draughts and would have another couple of titles under his belt if only Shane were not on amazing form.

Another great performance came from Bill Dobbins who finished 3rd, jointly with Nadia Chyzhevska, and he broke even with all the leading players.

Graham Young's time as an intermediate player is over (at least in Ireland), as he won the title this year and is now a fully fledged Master. Welcome to the big boys Graham.

SATISFACTION ALMOST GUARANTEED!

Thank you to those who took the trouble to complete and return the questionnaire. The results are valuable.

The responders were almost unanimous in their satisfaction with the EDA. Items noted for improvement are that the website content is largely out-of-date, that there is little provided to assist novices in the game, including absence of a youth programme, and there is a lack of diversity both in the range of card & board games that we play (eg chess, scrabble, othello) as well as ethnic/gender mix.

WHO ARE WE?

The personal profiles showed that members had joined at a range of ages, with clusters in the 20s year-old and in the 50s. Ignoring general social changes, this might suggest that recruitment is most likely outside of parents with at-home children. Current members are predominantly over sixty years old, showing that they are very loyal to the EDA: a fact borne out by 42% holding Life Membership status. The majority of responders declared themselves "experienced" in regard to playing skills. Some declared themselves at local match (ie intermediate) skill level, whilst a couple were novices and masters respectively. Does this indicate that novices are not attracted to join, or that such folks were, for the most part, too shy to return the questionnaire?

Unfortunately the question about reasons for joining the EDA was answered both as a single choice by some and as multi-choice by others but the cumulative answers probably still give a fair indication of members' motives. Top reason was to play competitively. Close runner-up was to get game news and information: 22% of our membership is foreign and presumably only really benefit in receipt of the *Journal*, so that the figure would have been much higher if more than one of them had responded. Some members also thought the meeting of fellow players was a motive, whilst some referred to past attraction of postal competition.

THE JOURNAL AND SUBSCRIPTIONS

The *Journal* is presently distributed by email to 43% of members and printed copy by post to the other 57%. This was shown by a similar ratio (40/60) of responders. Those who currently get a paper copy of the *Journal* are concerned about the plea to change to email distribution to reduce costs (probably due to their lack of computers). They are correspondingly willing to pay a premium to maintain the present arrangements. The maximum acceptable subscription rate was generally advised to be in the £15 to £25 range, with one USA member going up to £50 p/a.

HELP WITH PLAYING SKILLS

The prevalence of experienced player responses overshadowed any massive desire for training but some of them, surprisingly, added to the lesser skilled in welcoming play help by electronic means. Perhaps for the skilled players this is in order to gain familiarity with the programmes rather than their game skills? Workshops were mostly *not* favoured.

Those who might be willing to act as skills trainers were equal across use of electronics and workshops.

Reasons given for not competing were relatively limited. An entry or two for loss of interest (postal play impotence in light of computerisation), lack of skill and cost were cited but the bigger problem is poor health/age.

The idea of having graded skill level competitions was attractive to half of the respondents if the experienced player answers are set aside. The all-in split is more like 60% interest. Master players also appear to want a tier for themselves.

OTHER SERVICES


It appears that virtually all members have some collection of draughts books. Therefore, there were only a few members interested in access to a specialist library.

Finally members were asked if they would like their name and address published in the *Journal* with a view to contact from fellow members. Half were amenable.

WHAT HAPPENS NOW?

The findings will be presented to the *EDA Executive Committee* for their December review with reference to discussions on subscriptions and future activities.






Problem 290 (1927)

White to move & win





Black to move & win







MEMORIAL OF JOAN CAWS

Joan Caws was England's greatest ladies draughts player. This article was written in September, intended as a "Player Profile" for the March issue. Sadly, she died in early November. Ian has allowed us to publish this as a memorial to her playing career and off-board achievements.

When my brother Bill Halsey, an established Birmingham player, took me to an Open Air Tournament in St. Nicholas Park, Warwick, I could not have possibly foreseen the future that Draughts would have in store for me. I was the only woman in company with fifty men but it was also there that I met my future husband, Ian. We played draughts together in the 1969 English Open. Both of us played in the 1971 event, which coincided with our honeymoon.

Thereafter, I competed in almost every English and British Open Tournament for the following 42 years, as well as many other events in the U.K., Republic of Ireland, U.S.A. and Denmark. I had the good fortune to win the British Ladies Championship in 1979 and the World Ladies title in 1986 and successfully defended it three times.

I had the honour of being the first lady ever to play for England, in the Home Internationals at Morecambe in 1992 (a match against Scotland, Wales and the Republic of Ireland).

The following year my nemesis was met, namely the capable hands of Patricia Breen, and a year later in the (as then titled) British & Irish Ladies Championship, to her sister Karena. I gained some consolation in 1995 by



beating a very game Cheryl Hall by a narrow margin to claim the English Ladies title.

Apart from wins at championships my other favourite successes in the game were taking three notable scalps when guesting for Guernsey in the 1984 Home Internationals and obtaining a win for Great Britain & Ireland in the 2004 match against the USA in Las Vegas.

Apart from my playing career, which ended with a Counties Match against my West Midlands friends, I have enjoyed 37 years as Treasurer and representative abroad. I had the privilege of being a referee at Charles Walker's successful attempt breaking the World Simultaneous Record by playing 306 opponents at Dolly Parton's Dollywood in Tennessee and as a referee at the 1st World Mind Sports event in Beijing in 2008.

Another memorable trip was a visit to Lausanne, Switzerland, together with Charles and Delores Walker and Ian to meet the Olympic President in a vain attempt to get Draughts into the Olympic Games!

Most of all, Draughts has made many friends for me and I shall always cherish the many memories we have shared together.


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PLAYER PROFILE No.2

JOHN JOLLIFF

John Jolliff is a well-known player and motivator of the Cornwall Draughts Association. The degree of respect for his work in promotion of the game is highlighted by his elevation to the role of President of the EDA up to April this year. He gives us this modest review of his draughts career.



As a boy I played chess and draughts with my father who was a keen player. I enjoyed both games and was able to win them all against my school mates! That was in the 1930s/40s.

It was not until 1965 that I found out that there was a chess and draughts club at Liskeard, just 10 miles from home, which I promptly joined. I told myself I would learn all there is to know about draughts and then join the chess section! Now, in 2017, I am beginning to wonder if I will ever join the chess section!

Two years passed before I won a game in the club competition. As a competitor in my first local tournament, I found myself in the last round with no points but the same as my opponent. We managed a draw.

In 1973 the English Open was held at Liskeard and I progressed to third from bottom, having enjoyed every game and was quite pleased with myself. Since then I have played regularly at the Liskeard club until it stopped operating in 2003 due to lack of members. Afterwards a few of us have continued with games played in each others' homes.

When playing an opponent in the Liskeard club, we left a game in a complicated position because of lack of time, and I told my friend (who was giving me a lift home) that I could win where ever my opponent chose to move. He disagreed and we stopped at my home and played the game until past midnight convincing ourselves that I was in a winning position. The next week my opponent moved to what seemed to be a loss, but it turned out to be a draw.

I have always enjoyed the game and been a regular player in amateur and many other tournaments over the years. Competing against better players has helped improve my game, reaching runner-up position in 1986 and 1991. I proceeded to win the Amateur competition in 2000.

West Cornwall played an East Cornwall team each year, with about 30 men each side, until 2000. On one occasion I was asked to play for the opposition because they had fewer players. My two wins and four points for the enemy, on that occasion, did not please the captain of the east team one bit!

In recent years draughts has taken me to France and Italy to play in the days when Brian Lucas promoted World Qualifiers. In the summer of 2016 I had two exciting and enjoyable days with the former English Match Play Champion Brian Lucas. After a well fought battle I managed a win, my most notable play success to date.

My greatest achievement to date, however, I consider to have been meeting and making friends with players not only from England, Scotland, Ireland and Wales, but also from many other parts of the World.
