A FUTURE FOR THE EDA?

The EDA is now virtually without officers and no volunteers had come forward to take on their duties. Without officers the EDA cannot function and our bank account is understood to be frozen whilst probate is enacted on Ian Caws' estate. Lack of activity by members means there will be nothing to put in a Journal so this issue is the last.

Enquiries are in hand with the SDA to consider a possible merger. Apart from terminal cessation of the EDA another option is to continue only in electronic format (ie website and Facebook), subject to having someone to run it. NEW FACES TO DRAUGHTS TOURNAMENT

The competition was divided into two sections of six players which nicely matched their self-assessment of skill level. Thus every player had a real fifty percent chance of winning the three cash prizes to each section. I insisted on a straight meet every player format per section rather than Swiss rules. The players were great at keeping things at a lively pace and although timing led me to expect only eight games we managed to do ten so that everyone did play everyone else! It was Go As You Please. After some discussion it was decided that in the event of a tie for any place then the cumulative monies would be split equally.

A genuine new face Eljus Shipovski was a revelation. He is an Estonian now resident in Coventry. His clean sweep in the novice section (earning £250) was only contained in the two games against William Leeper who held him to draws. Leeper came through to take the second place (£150). Mark Cohen was pleased with his improved play to claim a clear third spot (£100). Gary Pollard came from Northumberland and brought enthusiastic ideas to help the EDA. Thanks also to Stuart Pearman and Rob Greenaway for challenging play.

In the competent players section top place was earned by Pat Cremin (£250) after a late surge to score ahead of challenger Tony Hynes. At the same time old-hand Mike Peach rallied to take a share of the equal second place with Tony Hynes (prize money split £125 each).

My sincere thanks to Tony Boyle for his prolonged efforts to persuade the West MIdlands contingent to enter this event and to him for taking on the duties of referee. On the day Ken Lovell provided valuable assistance with official duties. Feedback on the day was positive and all would like to see similar events organised in other parts of England.

THE END HAS ARRIVED

A personal assessment by Paul Braithwaite

We can only achieve what members put in. Recent participation has fallen at an alarming rate. Our predominantly elderly membership have been dying off, or say they are now so infirmed (physically or mentally) that they can no longer play the game and mostly contribute nothing. Surprising that folks with so many memories and the odd photo or other memorabilia could not even be bothered to write a paragraph for the Journal or send an item for the Collector's Corner spot. As Editor I have had to introduce photos (adds cost and printing time) to fill space as well as gain material from two American contributors and a number of other Foreign sources to cover the huge cracks in the Journal by the paucity of EDA activity.

All Affiliate groups, with the exception of West Midlands, have collapsed and the Counties Cup is a thing of the past.

Another burden has been the life members. It was a great bargain 20-years ago to pay 20 years worth as a life member subscription in the 1970s (say) so that now those folks have had twenty years membership (2000 to 2019) at the EDA expense, printing and sending *Journals* and, at least recently, little input in return.

There has been a bright side to the coin. Ken Lovell, Tony Boyle, David Kotin, Melvyn Green and Chris Reekie made numerous valuable contributions; Liam Stephens, Frank Moran and Bill Dobbins have also contributed to the *Journal*.

Debra Louise McManus has made a fantastic transformation to our website as well as providing a popular Facebook chat site. Unfortunately, those media facilities are free to anyone and leaves no incentive to pay for being in the EDA, so something good might also be part of our problem.

We have been getting by without an official Publicity Officer for some years. The Constitution positions the holder as being "respon-

sible for obtaining the maximum possible media coverage for events run by the Association and for endeavouring to swell the membership numbers." It has been interpreted to mean that person does everything to get members, so everyone else sits back and watches. Who would take such a job?

The entire EDA Constitution is badly formed and, in any case, was written over the years and adapted to suit a bygone, larger organisation. In my view any continuing body should throw it away and write a new Constitution suited to circumstances and limited goals. A certain person has been using the rules to block proposed changes to keep us going (proposed by me since late 2017), I believe, for his own self aggrandizement.


Smooth running of the EDA for decades by Ian Caws and Ken Lovell left everyone complacent. The sad passing in October of Ian has left a big hole, notably in financial control. There is a desperate need for a Treasurer for without such there can be no organisation; no way to take subscriptions and thus no members. Also, Ken Lovell has decided that it will not be the same without Ian and is stepping down from the Secretary role.

With only two possible events planned for 2020 there is no point in having a *Journal* nor my renewal of membership subscription.


TRUE COMPOSERS?

1. By Matt Long and by Melvyn Green.




Draughts "problems" have been included in specialist periodicals for almost as long as the game itself. The reader is challenged to identify moves required to fulfil a particular ending. The skill and artistry of the creator (variously called the author or composer) of these set pieces is in the revalation of surprise endings.

With such a volume of problems over the years it comes as no surprise to learn that on occasion the same problem has been created by separate composers in the same time period. Melvyn Green has had past experience of others not so open to the likelihood of chance duplication.











IAN CAWS "MR EDA"

A memoir by KEN LOVELL

I am sorry to report the death of Ian Caws at the age of 85. He was taken ill on return to England from Barbados and died in hospital on 11th October.[?]

Ian had been a great friend of mine for nearly 50 years. He first became an EDA officer in 1974, since when he served mainly as chairman but also as president and in later years as treasurer, taking over from his wife Joan. For many years all EDA activities have revolved around him and he could truly be called "Mr EDA". He was a great ambassador for the game and was well known and respected both here and abroad. He was scrupulously fair in his judgements and dealt with all matters in a calm and efficient manner.

In earlier years he and Joan promoted draughts among youngsters on the Isle of Wight and encouraged them to enter the national youth championships.

Although his forte was organising he was no mean player; he was captain of the HOBBI county team and played for England B, was English Amateur Champion in 2013 and won the West Midlands League in 2000. He regularly took part in or refereed national tournaments.

Ian was also an enthusiastic and accomplished Scrabble player. He had an unusual hobby in that he collected mugs from British football clubs playing in major and minor leagues. Ian's death is a sad blow to the EDA, his relatives and friends.

Other tributes to Ian Caws:

Richard Beckwith, President of the *American Checker Federation* noted Ian to have been "a true gentleman."

Lindus Edwards rated Ian to have been a "great friend" and was so saddened by the news. A similar note came from Slava Gorin (Russia).

WELSH OPEN

The Welsh Open this year had 17 players from Ireland, Scotland, Wales, England and Italy! Unknown to us all Sergio Scarpetta, the world champion, turned up probably for a bit of practice before playing Ron King in Barbados. Ron had earned the right to challenge Sergio for the world title. As I would say the usual suspects turned up and a very good tournament was enjoyed by all.

Sergio played magnificently and won ten out of 12 games, with only Brian Lucas and Addie Harper holding him to draws. I myself had a good position with Sergio which disintegrated in the last few moves of the game.

Sergio graciously told us where we went wrong, even looking deep to find draws in the games. He was indeed a worthy winner and I hope he will consider coming back to Wales again, maybe even bring a few playing friends. He may as time permits send some of the games with annotation for the Journal.

PLAYER PROFILE

SERGIO SCARPETTA

Interview notes by TONY BOYLE

I started playing draughts (Italian style) in 1987 at age 12. I entered a school tournament and won. A friend gave me four books on the English game. They were Tinsley's Way, Kear's Encyclopedia, Basic Checkers and Tescheleit.

I became master of Italian draughts at age 16 and was also strong at the English game, having started that version in 2009. I won the Italian Championship of English Draughts (Checkers) eight times.

In the world title GAYP match against Ron King the score was 2 wins, 2 losses and 20 draws, all tied, so Ron retained his title. Two years later I beat Ron King with the score of 2

wins, 1 loss and 17 draws. Another two years later I lost in GAYP to Michele Borghetti by 1 loss and 25 draws! That same year I won the match against Borghetti by 6 wins, 1 loss and 29 draws.

At present, after playing in the Welsh Open (10 wins, 2 draws) I am off to Barbados to play Ron King and defend my world title. I consider myself the same strength at English Draughts and Italian Draughts.

Italy won a match versus USA by one game. There were eight players including one woman and one youth per side.

In Italy there are around 60,000 players,* mostly voungsters and around 100 clubs. Youth tournaments can have 200-300 competitors in a tournament. Italian Draughts is taught in Schools and is government sponsored. I am a school teacher and believe people should be going into schools in Britain to stimulate a new generation to play draughts.

(** Editor's Note: 60,000 probably relates to the number of schoolchildren who have to attend game classes, as compared to taking history classes in England! But still an impressive coverage as is the number of clubs attendance being voluntary).

SOME THOUGHTS ON THE STATE OF THE EDA

So much is on the net that there is no need to pay for a *Journal* when you can get the information online. Another big issue is the elderly bias of our membership with, I would say, an average age of 70-80 years. No new blood has been coming in.

I am trying to be a realist, not a pessimist. I know of clubs of players of almost unknown games that have bigger membership than the seventy odd of the EDA. We are a minority amongst minority gamesters.

It is hoped that a
Treasurer and Secretary can
be found. Ken Lovell feels it
is time to step down as
Secretary. He had a special
friendship with Ian Caws and
feels unable to continue
alone. I have no wish to take
on those roles but could
continue to contribute as
Publicity Officer/Youth
Coordinator.

The EDA does not deserve to die yet. If it does, then the West Midlands club will keep going with 10 players, or so, and sometimes attracts others from further afield. Perhaps fresh local clubs elsewhere could keep the game alive in England. Perhaps we will start a newsletter to keep players in touch with each other. (END)

PLAYER PROFILE No. 7

TOM WATSON

The leading Scottish player of modern times gives a summary of his life as a draughts player. He then airs some strong views about the use of opening move ballots. In his cover letter Tom revealed himself to now be 75 years old and afflicted with arthritis: too old to learn new ballots.

Back in 1962 I worked in the offices of the now defunct Scottish Cooperative Wholesale Society. One day someone brought in a makeshift draughts board and Coca Cola bottle tops were used as pieces! At a later time better equipment was brought in for lunchtime play and I became interested, expecially when four draughts books were found in the public library that I used. This added to my knowledge because as a Co-Op employee I saw the paper called "Reynolds News" and later the "Sunday Citizen."

I wrote to Cohen and this led me to Bridgeton W.M.C. in the summer of 1963 and I have been active ever since. In 1965 I played

in the Scottish Open and for most years since have competed in various events.

I have not had a meteoric rise and only became winner of a major event in 1977 when I gained the English Open title. Since then my tally is 10 Scottish, 4 English, 3 British, 3 Irish, 3 Northern Ireland Senior and 2 British & Irish Freestlye titles. I have played for Scotland a few times and 5 times for UK & Ireland against the USA. My score against the USA is 16 wins, 15 losses and 69 draws.

Looking back I realise that I came into the game at the right time. Today in the UK and Ireland there is a lack of really strong players. Only active now is Shane McCosker. Hugh Devlin and Richard Pask have for some time been absent from crossboard play, whilst Billy Docherty is based in France.

WATSON PROFILE CONTINUED

I have had the pleasure of playing Jim Marshall, Eddie Gibson, Jim Grant, Bill Edwards, Ivor Edwards, Graham Davies, Alf Huggins, Tom Landry and Pat McCarthy - all now gone. John McGill still lives but is housebound and I so play him on a friendly basis.

Players starting out now have not encountered the old kind of competition. Sad to say that the game is only hanging on by its fingertips.

When I came into the game we had 137 ballots which does seem sufficient! Many of those ballots were critical but now there are too many. 5 were added in the early 1970s and another 2 in the 1990s. Then all of a sudden 12 were added for no good reason that I can fathom. I think of them as the dirty dozen!!!

It is notable that GAYP, or Freestyle, still produces wins even amongst top players. Years ago I suggested that 2-move ballots would be enough to suit most players and the person I spoke to agreed. He then voted to add these really terrible openings.

I believe that when tourneys only have 10 chances to get a ballot (or 8 in the modern day Irish Open) then more means less. A return to 137 or 144 would be a good idea. (END)






